He loved her very much. She was not strong, and he did everything he could to take care of her.

Shortly after their marriage, they went on a journey. From Italy, they visited Germany and France. I, their eldest child, was born in Naples. For several years, I was their only child. They loved me greatly. My mother, however, wanted to have a daughter as well as a son.

One day, when I was about five years old, my mother was walking near Lake Como. She came to a small cottage. A poor family lived in it. There were five young children. One of them looked different from the others. She had golden hair and blue eyes. They all had dark hair and dark

eyes. She was a very pretty child. My mother asked about Resher. The woman explained that the child was not hers. She was an orphan. Her father had gotten into serious trouble of some kind and had gone to prison in Austria.

My mother took the child and asked my father if he would allow her to live with us. He agreed. The child's name was Elizabeth Lavenza. My mother said, "I am giving you Elizabeth as a present, Victor." She became my playmate. There was only a year's difference in our ages. I grew to love her, and I knew that I would love her until I died. I believed that she was mine and only mine. We spent our childhood together. I read widely, wanting to learn about everything. Elizabeth, however, was more interested in art and poetry and the beauty of the countryside where we lived.

My parents traveled during the first seven years of my life, but when my mother had a second child, a boy, they stopped traveling. I was sent to school. There, I made friends with a boy of my own age, Henry Clerval. He liked to write plays and songs, act, and sing. He read books about famous men and women of the past. He was very romantic. His interests were nearer to those of Elizabeth than to mine. It was his ambition to do well in the world. I was more interested in science and trying to understand the mysteries of life and death. My ambition was to learn as much as I could. Whereas Henry and Elizabeth were both gentle, quiet children, I was often bad-tempered and angry even though I had nothing to be angry about. I had a perfect childhood in every way.

When I was thirteen years of age, we all went on a visit to Thonon. The weather was so bad that we had to stay indoors in the inn. Looking for something to read, I found a book by Cornelius Agrippa. I was so excited by its contents that I told my father.

"My dear Victor," he said, "do not waste your time upon nonsense." If my father had explained then why Agrippa's ideas were nonsense, I would not have read the book. But he did not, and I read the book with great interest. When we got back home, I bought everything Agrippa had written as well as books by Paracelsus and Albertus Magnus. I became very interested in the search for a chemical that could turn any metal into gold and for whatever it was that gave us life and left us when we died. I was also very interested in ghosts and devils.

When I was about fifteen years old, there was a bad storm. Lightning struck a tree near our house. It turned the tree into thin pieces of wood. It completely destroyed the tree. Until this time I had not studied electricity, but now I lost interest in everything else. My new interest was to lead to my own destruction.
