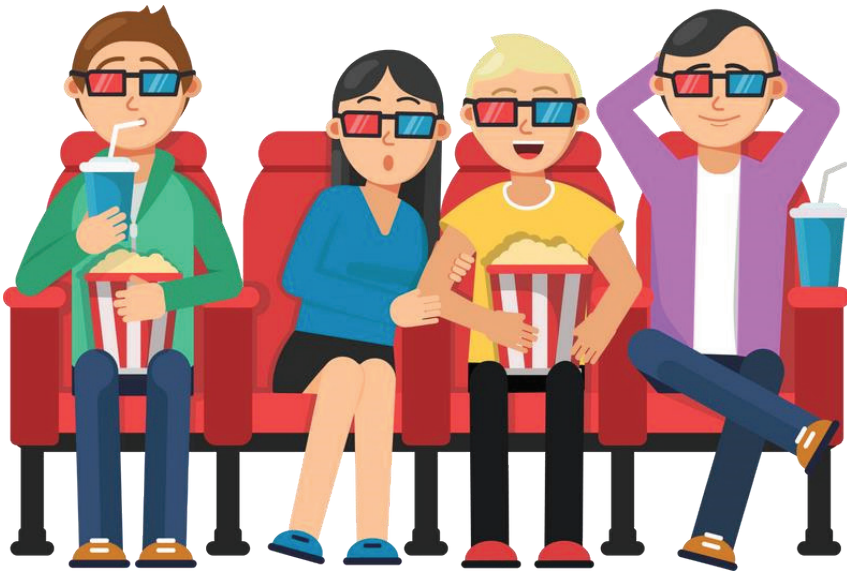

CHAPTER ONE

At the movies**Phrasal verbs**

A phrasal verb is a verb followed by an adverb or a preposition:

e.g.: to go - verb

- *to go + out - phrasal verb -> to go out*

to wait - verb

- *to wait +for - phrasal verb -> to wait for*

Phrasal verbs have a literal meaning or a different meaning.

We use phrasal verbs in informal and spoken English.



- *Examples:*

ask out - invite on a date

call back - return a phone call

cheer up - make someone happier

count on - rely on

drop by - come unannounced

eat out - eat at a restaurant

get back - return

get together - meet

hang out - spend time relaxing

pick out - choose

run out - have none left
